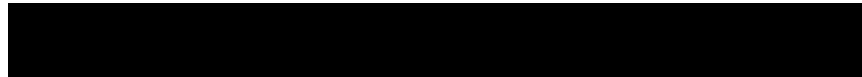
What's Happening in the MPA Program?

New MPA Diversity Scholarship

The NKU MPA program has a new Diversity Scholarship, which is designed for students with a demonstrated commitment to enhancing the understanding and appreciation of diverse populations. The program plans to award the first scholarship of \$1,000 in Fall 2016.

Applicants must be new MPA students who have been fully admitted (not conditionally or provisionally) and write an essay detailing activities in which they will engage to promote diversity on campus and/or in the broader community. Preference will be given to students from underrepresented populations in the MPA program.

As has been the tradition for the past few years, the alumni award winner will be the guest speaker at the Spring Banquet. Recent winners have included: Larry Klein, City Manager of Covington; Jane Keller, CEO of Cincinnati Youth Collaborative; and Wade Williams, Senior Vice President for Business Retention and Expansion at the Northern Kentucky Tri-County Economic Development Corporation (Tri-ED).

The annual MPA/ASPA dinner took place on Tuesday, February 23. Eric Avner, CEO of People's Liberty, talked about this five-year initiative that grants funding to individuals who have "big ideas" to transform the region. This approach of granting funds to individuals, or social entrepreneurs, is in contrast to the traditional approach by most foundations of granting funds to nonprofit organizations.



A flagship program of People's Liberty is the Haile Fellowship, which is a \$100,000 grant awarded to two individuals each year who have identified major challenges in the region and potential strategies for addressing them. The fellows also receive 12 months of space at People's Liberty, which is located in the historic Globe Furniture building near Findlay Market in Over-the-Rhine, as well as assistance with marketing and outreach.

The dinner was co-hosted by the NKU MPA program and the Greater Cincinnati Chapter of the American Society for Public Administration (ASPA), which is the largest professional association for managers in public and nonprofit organizations.

Fall Reception speaker focused on sexual orientation in public environments
